Biblical Studies (ABS) & Theology (ATH)

Academic degree offering a comprehensive curriculum in the different aspects of the Bible including the Old Testament, New Testament and Gospels. The curriculum leading to the ABS and ATH degree is normally a two-year, 61-unit course of instruction designed to give students a basic biblical and theological foundation in preparation for a wide variety of Christian ministries. Students who successfully complete the ABS or ATH are encouraged to continue to the Bachelor's program at MCBC.
